SUBJECT: Landowner Consent to Decommission the Ormond Beach Fuel Oil Pipeline

RECOMMENDATION

That City Council authorize the City Manager to execute a letter granting Southern California Edison (SCE) permission to decommission the obsolete Ormond Beach fuel oil pipeline located on City-owned property.

DISCUSSION

The California Coastal Commission (Commission) has requested that SCE obtain permission from the City of Oxnard for decommissioning of an underground obsolete SCE fuel oil pipeline that extends under the City-owned never-developed Ormond Boulevard right-of-way and two other City-owned parcels (231-007-001 and 231-007-002) in the Ormond Beach area.

SCE proposes to decommission the obsolete, three-mile, 16-inch diameter fuel oil pipeline that begins in Port Hueneme and extends eastward beneath Surfside Drive to Ocean View Drive. After crossing the J Street drain, the pipeline enters the City of Oxnard and continues southeast beneath the right-of-way of the never-developed Ormond Boulevard, then under Coastal Conservancy land to a point just south of the Reliant power plant, where the pipeline then turns north and ends on the site of the former SCE fuel tank farm. The Commission has jurisdiction over most of the pipeline and is reviewing a permit that will authorize SCE's decommissioning work on and under City- and California Conservancy-owned land. The City has permitting jurisdiction only over the last 700-foot segment from Ormond Beach to the former fuel tank farm, and on June 4, 2007 the Development Services Director approved a Coastal Development Review Permit for the work located primarily on the power plant property.

The fuel oil pipeline was in use between 1972 and 2000 when SCE owned and operated the Ormond Beach power plant with its tank farm. When the Ormond Beach power plant converted to natural gas, the pipeline and tank farm were no longer needed. In 2005, the portside segment

of the pipeline within Port Hueneme was decommissioned and slurry-sealed in place. This project completes the decommissioning and the process will take approximately four months. SCE proposes to conduct soil sampling and remediation as needed, inspect and clean the pipeline with a remote device called a "pig", fill a portion of the pipeline with cement slurry, remove pipeline markers, and abandon the remaining pipeline in place. The U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service preferred that the pipeline not be removed through the tidal lagoon, which is periodically exposed at low tide, as the removal process would disturb sensitive habitats.

At its June 28, 2007 meeting, the Water Task Force directed staff to oppose the abandon-in-place alternative and encourage the pipeline removal alternative within the wetlands restoration area, and recommend pipeline removal from the City's coastal property adjacent to the Wastewater Treatment Plant. These statements are included in the authorization letter.


FINANCIAL IMPACT

RE: Approval of the City of Oxnard as Property Owner for Southern California Edison (SCE) Port Hueneme to Ormond Beach Pipeline Decommissioning Project

Dear Ms. Livia:

The California Coastal Commission (Commission) has requested that SCE obtain permission from the City of Oxnard as an impacted property owner for decommissioning of an underground, obsolete, SCE fuel-oil pipeline that extends under the City-owned Ormond Boulevard right-of-way and two other City-owned parcels (231-007-001 and 231-007-002) in the Ormond Beach area.

The City Council of the City Of Oxnard has directed me to extend the City's permission to SCE and/or SCE contractors and subcontractors to decommission the Ormond Beach fuel oil pipeline in a manner described in the December 2006 "Project Execution Plan," as amended, subject to California Coastal Commission and City of Oxnard permits and/or conditions, as applicable. The City Council recommends that the pipeline be removed from the City's coastal property adjacent to the Wastewater Treatment Plant, and encourages the pipeline be removed within the wetlands restoration area.
